#### FIRST READING: Isaiah 44:6-8



### SECOND READING: Romans 8:12-25


Until mid-September, we'll be reading most of the book of Romans straight through. In his complicated argument, Paul notes that, try as we might, we cannot fulfill the law's demands, but that by God's grace in Jesus, we are not simply reconciled to God, but freed from the law. But "it is for freedom that we have been set free."

<sup>12</sup>So then, brothers and sisters, we are debtors, not to the flesh, to live according to the flesh— <sup>13</sup>for if you live according to the flesh, you will die; but if by the Spirit you put to death the deeds of the body, you will live. <sup>14</sup>For all who are led by the Spirit of God are children of God. <sup>15</sup>For you did not receive a spirit of slavery to fall back into fear, but you have received a spirit of adoption. When we cry, "Abba! Father!" <sup>16</sup>it is that very Spirit bearing witness with our spirit that we are children of God, <sup>17</sup>and if children, then heirs, heirs of God and joint heirs with Christ—if, in fact, we suffer with him so that we may also be glorified with him.

<sup>18</sup>I consider that the sufferings of this present time are not worth comparing with the glory about to be revealed to us. <sup>19</sup>For the creation waits with eager longing for the revealing of the children of God; <sup>20</sup>for the creation was subjected to futility, not of its own will but by the will of the one who subjected it, in hope <sup>21</sup>that the creation itself will be set free from its bondage to decay and will obtain the freedom of the glory of the children of God. <sup>22</sup>We know that the whole creation has been groaning in labor pains until now; <sup>23</sup>and not only the creation, but we ourselves, who have the first fruits of the Spirit, groan inwardly while we wait for adoption, the redemption of our bodies. <sup>24</sup>For in hope we were saved. Now hope that is seen is not hope. For who hopes for what is seen? <sup>25</sup>But if we hope for what we do not see, we wait for it with patience.

# **GOSPEL:** Matthew 13:24-30, 36-43

This chapter is made up of parables, of which today's reading is the second. Again, one of the points of these stories is how differently God behaves than we do."

<sup>24</sup>Jesus put before the crowds another parable: "The kingdom of heaven may be compared to someone who sowed good seed in his field;<sup>25</sup>but while everybody was asleep, an enemy came and sowed weeds among the wheat, and then went away. <sup>26</sup>So when the plants came up and bore grain, then the weeds appeared as well. <sup>27</sup>And the slaves of the householder came and said to him, 'Master, did you not sow good seed in your field? Where, then, did these weeds come from?' <sup>28</sup>He answered, 'An enemy has done this.' The slaves said to him, 'Then do you want us to

go and gather them?' <sup>29</sup>But he replied, 'No; for in gathering the weeds you would uproot the wheat along with them. <sup>30</sup>Let both of them grow together until the harvest; and at harvest time I will tell the reapers, Collect the weeds first and bind them in bundles to be burned, but gather the wheat into my barn.'"

<sup>36</sup>Then he left the crowds and went into the house. And his disciples approached him, saying, "Explain to us the parable of the weeds of the field." <sup>37</sup>He answered, "The one who sows the good seed is the Son of Man; <sup>38</sup>the field is the world, and the good seed are the children of the kingdom; the weeds are the children of the evil one, <sup>39</sup>and the enemy who sowed them is the devil; the harvest is the end of the age, and the reapers are angels. <sup>40</sup>Just as the weeds are collected and burned up with fire, so will it be at the end of the age. <sup>41</sup>The Son of Man will send his angels, and they will collect out of his kingdom all causes of sin and all evildoers, <sup>42</sup>and they will throw them into the furnace of fire, where there will be weeping and gnashing of teeth. <sup>43</sup>Then the righteous will shine like the sun in the kingdom of their Father. 

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### About Today's Hymns

**Today's Gathering Hymn,** *Come,* **Ye Thankful People,** *Come,* was written by English clergyman, **Henry Alford**, **D.D.(1810-1871)**, who was educated at Trinity College, Cambridge and graduating with honors, in 1832. His literary labors extended to every department of literature, but his noblest undertaking was his edition of the Greek Testament, the result of 20 years' labor. His hymnological and poetical works were numerous, which included the compiling of collections, the composition of original hymns, and translations from other languages.

The tune for this hymn, **St. George's Windsor**, was composed by English organist and choir master, **George Job Elvey (1816-1893).** At age nineteen Elvey became organist and master of the boys' choir at St. George Chapel, Windsor, where he remained until his retirement in 1882. He was frequently called upon to provide music for royal ceremonies such as Princess Louise's wedding in 1871 (after which he was knighted). Elvey also composed hymn tunes, anthems, oratorios, and service music.

**Today's Hymn of the Day,** *Almighty God, Your Word is Cast,* was written by English priest, John Cawood (1775-1852), who, having grown up on a farm, experienced very limited educational advantages. However, seeking every opportunity for self improvement, and aided by those who believed in and supported him, he was able to enter S. Edmund Hall, Oxford, and obtain his B.A. in 1801, and his M.A. in 1807. He was ordained in 1801, and most of his life in the ministry was spent as perpetual Curate of S. Ann's Chapel of Ease, Bewdley, Worcestershire.

The original form of the tune to which this hymn is sung, **St. Flavian,** was first published in *The Whole Booke of Psalmes* of 1562 which was the completion of the English psalter. The composer of the tune is unknown, although the original, full version was intended for Psalm 132, a Common Meter Double text.

Many hymnals use a harmonization based on one by **Richard Redhead (1820–1901)**, from his *Church Hymn Tunes Ancient & Modern* of 1853. The tune was then called **REDHEAD NO. 29** and set to four different texts. In the revised edition of 1875, the tune was renamed **ST. FLAVIAN**, in honor of St. Flavian of Constantinople.

The Communion Hymn, *We Marvel at the Words, O Christ,* was written by the Rev. Dr. Herman G. Stuempfle, Jr.(1923-2007). Living most of his life in Gettysburg, PA, he served as President of the Lutheran Theological Seminary in Gettysburg, where he also obtained his Divinity Degree. The Rev. Dr. Stuempfle was the author of several books and numerous articles and lectures on preaching, history, and theology, and was also among the most honored and respected hymn writers of the 20th and 21st centuries. Rev. Dr. Stuempfle was also especially known for his leadership in community and civic projects: he participated in the creation of day care centers, served on the Gettysburg interchurch social action committee, helped create and support prison ministries and a homeless shelter, and tutored young people in the after-school program of Christ Lutheran Church, where he was a long time member. The tune to which Rev. Stuempfle's hymn is sung is an English folk tune, **Forest Green**, arranged by English composer, conductor teacher, editor and collector of folk music, **Ralph Vaughan Williams (1872-1958)**, who has become the chief figure in the realm of English music and church music in the first half of the twentieth century. His education included instruction at the Royal College of Music in London and Trinity College, Cambridge, as well as additional studies in Berlin and Paris. Vaughan Williams taught music at the Royal College of Music, conducted the Bach Choir in London, and directed the Leith Hill Music Festival in Dorking. A knowledgeable collector of folk songs, he composed numerous arrange-ments of them, and many of his compositions show the impact of folk rhythms and melodic modes. But most important to the history of hymnody, he was music editor of the most influential British hymnal at the beginning of the twentieth century, *The English Hymnal* (1906), and coeditor (with Martin Shaw) of *Songs of Praise* (1925, 1931) and the *Oxford Book of Carols* (1928).

**Today's Sending Hymn,** *On What Has Now Been Sown,* was written by English clergyman and hymnwriter, **John Newton** (**1725-1807**) who joined his father at sea when he was merely eleven, enduring flogging, and being captured by a slave trader in West Africa. After escaping, he himself became the captain of a slave ship. When nearly drowning in 1748, then meeting his wife Mary Catlett, and reading Thomas Kempis' *Imitation of Christ*, he gave up the slave trade and eventually became an ardent abolitionist. Newton later was influenced by George Whitefield, as well as John and Charles Wesley, and began to study for the ministry. He was ordained in the Church of England, serving in Olney and London. His legacy to the Christian church includes his many hymns as well as his collaboration with William Cowper in publishing *Olney Hymns* (1779), to which Newton contributed 280 hymns, including the famous, "Amazing Grace."

The tune to which this hymn is sung, was composed by English vicar, poet and amateur musician, **John Darwall (1731-1789).** He composed a soprano tune and bass line for each of the 150 psalm versifications in the *Tate and Brady New Version of the Psalms of David* of 1696. In an organ dedication speech in 1773 Darwall advocated singing the "*Psalm tunes in quicker time than is commonly sung, so that six verses might be sung in the same space of time that four generally are.*"
